## Overview:

*Sociology of the Family* is a semester-long, elective course that is designed to provide a general understanding of why families are important social institutions and how family structures, household sizes, and living arrangements have changed significantly. Exploration of the family foundation, relationships, and family management skills will take place during class discussions, projects, and interactions.

## Student Objectives:

Students will be able to.....

- Become familiar with past and present data about family arrangements in the United States
- Identify and evaluate how culture (world) influences family dynamic and roles
- Evaluate important social institutions and how they respond to social needs.
- Determine the impact of change and transitions over the life course
- Evaluate the process for building and maintaining interpersonal relationships
- Determine factors that contribute to healthy and unhealthy relationships
- Consider the effects of personal needs on relationships
- Demonstrate communication skills that contribute to positive relationships and problem solving

## Rights and Responsibilities

Approach each day with the intention of doing the work (listening with your full attention, being present mentally and emotionally, participating fully, and honoring the work of others).

- Practice courtesy and care of others.
- Be prompt- in your seat when the bell rings (before and after).

### Attendance and Participation

It is essential to be in attendance each day as there is no substitute for what is missed in class discussions, interactions, and instruction. **IF A STUDENT MISSES 1<sup>st</sup> Period Sociology of Family, due to being late to school and then coming later in the school day to complete other classes, the student must make up the entire 48 minute class period to complete assigned work.**

Students who miss school for any reason will be required to make up tests, quizzes, assignments, or activities to receive daily participation points. ### Evaluation/Grading

Your overall grade in this course will be based on participation, class assignments, journals, projects, and assessments. The Grading Scale to be followed will be that which is published in the Lexington High School student handbook. Your grade in this class will be assigned as follows:

15% concept connections/reflections

40% major assessments (projects, tests)

15% quizzes

30% minor assessments (daily work, notes, homework, vocabulary)
