Grading Policies:

How to Submit work: All work here must be submitted on Google Docs through Turnitin.com unless otherwise specified. If work is not submitted by Google Docs, it may not be counted. On top of this, work must have the questions copied over to it on a google doc when answering questions.

Late and Absent Work: Any academic work turned in late will not receive full credit. Unless otherwise specified, work will be due at 11:59pm the day that it is due. Work will be accepted for a maximum of 70% until the quarter. Work cannot be submitted after the quarter has been completed. Certain assignments may be more time-sensitive and cannot be made up.

Excused absence work will fall in line with school policy and will not be considered late. If work is turned in after the grace period given, it will be considered late. All electronic work must also be submitted **before** the class period. (If not, it is considered to be late.)

Expectations on written work.

Students should read all assigned work to its fullest. Unless otherwise noted, work should be done in complete sentences. Responses should not be copied word for word from the text but instead be a reflection of the student's individual thought and reflection upon the material. If work is borrowed from an assigned text, it should be properly cited.

IT IS ALWAYS BETTER TO MAKE UP MISSING WORK.

Cheating—DO NOT DO IT! If cheating, suspected cheating, or attempted cheating takes place, you will receive an automatic zero on the assignment and appropriate disciplinary action. This includes the person who cheated off of the person as well as the person who provided the materials for them to cheat with. *** (Includes talking during a test) ***

You should never collaborate on your work with others unless you are instructed to do so by your instructor. The reason being is that it puts you in a potentially bad position. If that person plagiarizes from you either directly or indirectly, you are just as guilty as they are of academic dishonesty. The penalty for you turning in work from someone else may also affect grades regardless of when you turn it in. An example of this would be someone plagiarizing off of you on a late assignment. If you provide work to someone else that they plagiarize from you may

incur a penalty that will affect your work retroactively because it would still be under the umbrella of academic dishonesty.

Plagiarism—Plagiarism falls under the cheating category. Any text that is borrowed, quoted, or otherwise included from an outside source must be cited or its inclusion is considered plagiarism. If plagiarism occurs, you will receive a zero and will be further dealt with in accordance with school policy. If you do not know what plagiarism is in regard to an assignment, please ask.

General Rules for Academic Dishonesty

Students who are truthful in their dishonesty will be handled differently than ones that are dishonest in the framework of consequences. Habitual behavior will result in stricter penalties and will not be tolerated.

Artificial Intelligence: The use of artificial intelligence to write papers and submit them as your own is a violation of school policy. Everything you turn in for a grade should reflect your own individual thoughts and work. If found to have used AI and flagged for AI by our AI/Plagiarism detection software, the student will have to redo the assignment or part of the assignment in a homeroom period or after school in order to receive any degree of credit based on the instructor's discretion. Multiple violations or abuse of this policy may result in further disciplinary action.

Bathroom/Drinks/Safety
